EDITOR'S NOTE BY JAN SWAN:

An interesting and rather thought-provoking event occurred in a Munich, Germany, gallery (Pinakothek der Moderne). The exhibit was called "Glitch: on the Art of Interference" which was all about errors and malfunctions in art to "make visible what is invisible." The first piece that gallery goers saw upon entering the gallery was a piece with photographic images painted over in white. The painting was not the work of a modern master selected by the curators, but the work of a 51 y.o. technical worker employed by the gallery who had snuck it into the show in the early hours of the morning. Sadly, when the painting was discovered, the employee was fired. The irony of firing an otherwise "invisible" artist (a behind the scenes gallery worker) for making their work visible was not lost on journalists or the public, which saw the "interfering" artwork as a critical statement by one of the people who help make exhibitions happen but who usually remain unseen and unrecognized. The painting shows people whose faces and bodies are painted out, unidentifiable, invisible. I hope the artist finds her/his way in the art world and gets an exhibit and recognition as an artist, just because.
